

# Lake Shore's Public Schools Non-thomestead Operating Millage Proposal





If approved by voters, this proposal will not affect the tax rate on a homeowner's primary residence (the home in which a Lake Shore homeowner lives).



Lake Shore Public Schools will lose approximately \$2.6 million yearly if the non-homestead millage is not approved by voters.



The non-homestead millage cannot exceed 18 mills. This amount must be approved by voters for Lake Shore Public Schools to receive its full share of State Aid.



All Michigan school districts must levy 18 mills on non-homestead property to receive their full foundation allowance.

The non-homestead millage is not levied on primary residences; it only applies to businesses, second homes, vacant land, and rental property.



This is not a new tax. LSPS voters originally approved the nonhomestead millage in 1994 and last renewed it in 2014.



The non-homestead operating millage generates approximately \$2.6 million annually. This is 5.7 percent of the school district's operating budget.



The operating budget covers everything necessary to provide educational programs and services in Lake Shore Public Schools.
